



Honoring Our Clinical Adjunct Faculty

The DFMCH thanks **Kimberly Lansing, MD, PhD**, a family physician at Gundersen Health System in La Crosse, Wisconsin. Dr. Lansing is a Primary Care Clerkship (PCC) site leader and the Wisconsin Academy for Rural Medicine director for La Crosse. She also authored many of the PCC's problem-based learning cases and co-authored its doctorpatient communication course.



The DFMCH is deeply grateful to Dr. Lansing and the 324 clinical adjunct faculty statewide who provided clinical experiences for medical students, family medicine residents and PA students in FY15.

Education

In FY15, 62% of graduating DFMCH residents and 71% of graduating PA students entered practice in Wisconsin.

Physician Assistant (PA) Program

Leadership: Virginia Snyder, PhD, PA-C

The PA Program educated 93 students in campus-based and distance Master of Physician Assistant Studies (MPAS) program; 39 graduated in 2015.

Of the 31 graduates who are clinically employed, 22 (71%) entered practice in Wisconsin and 10 (32%) entered primary care.

In addition, 19 students graduated from the PA Program's master's degree completion program.



In May, 10 PA students (pictured above with UW SMPH Associate Dean for Public Health **Patrick Remington, MD, MPH**) graduated with the Path of Distinction (PoD) in Public Health.

The PoD is a UW SMPH initiative that integrates public health and community engagement in the PA and other health care education programs.

The DFMCH's statewide residency programs, dually accredited by ACGME and AOA, educated 128 residents. Of the 39 residents who graduated in 2015, 24 (62%) entered practice in Wisconsin.



Through inquiry, discovery, and community engagement, DFMCH researchers tackle Wisconsin's health challenges and work to transform primary care practice.


Alexandra Adams, MD, PhD, Leads Obesity Prevention Initiative



Alexandra Adams, MD, PhD, is the principal investigator on a new, five-year, \$7.5 million grant from the Wisconsin Partnership Program (WPP) that aims to address the state's obesity epidemic.

That grant, which is one facet of the WPP's new Wisconsin Obesity Prevention Initiative, provides the infrastructure to build strategic alignment among government entities, communities, researchers, advocates, nonprofit organizations and businesses.

Dr. Adams will lead a team of faculty and community investigators to develop a childhood obesity surveillance system and create statewide messaging on how daily decisions affect health.



In FY15, the DFMCH had \$6.6 million in grant awards. Projects focused on integrative medicine, childhood obesity prevention, upper respiratory diseases and primary care research.

In addition, the Wisconsin Research and Education Network, a statewide practice-based research network of primary care clinicians and researchers, engaged more than 1,200 clinicians, researchers and staff in Wisconsin and beyond.




