

Maureen Longeway, MD


The DFMCH honors **Maureen Longeway, MD,** an alumna of and faculty member at the Waukesha



Research

THROUGH INQUIRY, DISCOVERY, AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT, DFMCH RESEARCHERS TACKLE WISCONSIN'S HEALTH CHALLENGES AND AIM TO TRANSFORM PRIMARY CARE PRACTICE.

COACHING PROGRAM REDUCED OPIOID DOSES BY 11 PERCENT AT FOUR UW HEALTH CLINICS

A coaching program led by DFMCH faculty Randall Brown, MD, PhD, DFASAM: Aleksandra Zgierska, MD, PhD; and Andrew Quanbeck, PhD, helped family physicians in four UW Health clinics better follow opioid prescribing guidelines, resulting in an 11 percent reduction in opioid doses in those clinics.

The pilot project was funded by a grant from the National Institute on Drug Abuse. It's part of larger efforts by DFMCH researchers to improve understanding of opioid misuse and addiction development in the context of traumatic injury and pain management. The team intends to expand the program through a new federal grant beginning in FY19.





RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS

In FY18, the DFMCH had \$6.1 million in grant awards. Projects focused on addiction and substance misuse prevention and treatment, infectious disease surveillance and systems-engineering approaches for improving ambulatory care.

In addition, the Wisconsin Research and Education Network, a statewide practice-based research network of primary care clinicians and researchers, engaged more than 1,200 clinicians, researchers and staff in Wisconsin and beyond.




