

MEDICAL STUDENT EDUCATION

Faculty, staff, and statewide volunteer preceptors taught over 500 University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health (UWSMPH) students through a required clerkship, preceptorships and electives.

HONORING OUR FACULTY




David Deci, MD

The DFMCH honors **David Deci, MD,** director of medical student education. Since joining the DFMCH in 2009, he helped create a longitudinal curriculum for care of vulnerable populations with his expertise in poverty and advocacy.

Dr. Deci's accolades include six FMIG Program of Excellence Awards, the 2019 UWSMPH #1 Match Specialty, and rankings in the top 10-15 schools

for graduates matching into family medicine (FM). Other awards include the DFMCH Faculty Excellence Award (2011), Leonard Tow Humanism in Medicine Award (2012), Dean's Teaching Award (2013), Brillman Mentoring in FM Award (2014), AAFP Award for Distinguished Meritorious Service (2018), and the STFM Master Preceptor Award (2019). He was also a founding member of the Street Medicine Institute and is a founding member and current board chair of the Family Medicine Midwest Foundation.

We thank Dr. Deci along with our other DFMCH faulty and the 253 clinical adjunct faculty statewide who provided learning experiences for students and residents in FY19.



AAFP RECOGNIZES DR. MELISSA STILES, FAMILY MEDICINE INTEREST GROUP



ADDICTION MEDICINE FELLOWSHIP RECEIVES ACGME ACCREDITATION

The Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACMGE) officially conferred accreditation status—with no citations—on the DFMCH's multidisciplinary addiction medicine fellowship, effective July 1, 2018.

The accreditation demonstrates that the program meets ACGME quality standards for preparing graduates for practice as addiction medicine physicians.

Established in 2010 and led by national addiction medicine expert Randall Brown, MD, PhD, DFASAM, the fellowship is among the first in the nation to offer board certification in addiction medicine.





RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS


In FY19, the DFMCH had \$8.8 million in grant awards. Major projects focused on addiction and substance misuse prevention and treatment, infectious disease surveillance and systems-engineering approaches for improving ambulatory care.

In addition, the Wisconsin Research and Education Network, a statewide practice-based research network of primary care clinicians and researchers, engaged more than 1,200 clinicians, researchers and staff in Wisconsin and beyond in work across several content areas and methodologies.

An oral presentation by DFMCH Professor **Paul Smith, MD,** was selected as one of three distinguished presentations from over 1,000 submitted abstracts at the 2018 North American Primary Care Research Group (NAPCRG) annual meeting, held November 9-13, 2018, in Chicago.

The abstract, "United States Pharmacopeia Patient-Centered Prescription Medication Label Standards and Medication Adherence," describes how a team from Wisconsin Health Literacy, an organization for which Dr. Smith serves as medical advisor, piloted revised prescription medication labels at 65 sites in five pharmacy organizations. They found an association between the more patient-centered prescription medication labels and increased medication adherence. The project later expanded to include a larger number of sites and organizations.

Sal and Judy Troia have a deep appreciation for how integrative health approaches help them not only manage disease, but also improve their overall health and well-being.

That appreciation, coupled with a strong desire to help others, is behind their recent gift to establish the Judy L. and Sal. A Troia Visiting Professorship in Integrative Health at the DFMCH.



Sal and Judy, pictured at left, have been patients at UW Health Integrative Health for almost as long as the program has existed here.

Judy, a retired nurse and breast cancer survivor, particularly values the program's emphasis on fitness, mindfulness meditation and balance of Eastern and Western medicine.

Sal, a retired banking executive and bicycle racer who has lived with inflammatory bowel disease (IBD) for 55 years, says that the program's guidance on diet, nutrition and supplementation has been a valuable complement to conventional IBD treatment and a key part of staying healthy.


Both would like to increase awareness—in the eyes of the public and the medical community—of the benefits of integrative health.


