The awards also honor Michele Tracy, a second year UW medical student who was participating in an educational service program in Africa, when she tragically died in an accident in July 1999. These awards represent all she accomplished in community health in her short lifetime. Michele was heavily involved in LOCUS in medical school and worked hard to create and implement three community-based programs in New York to help people for years to

Ian Stormont graduated from the UW-Madison in 2005. After graduating, he joined Teach For America (TFA) and worked as a full-time, special education science teacher. He then worked on the TFA staff as a recruitment director and a program director, supporting 25 teachers on the Pine Ridge and Rosebud Indian reservations in South Dakota. Among the numerous concerns that the South Dakota reservations face, it was apparent that inadequate health care was negatively impacting many families. This experience brought him to the Wisconsin Academy for Rural Medicine (WARM) at UWSMPH. During medical school,

he has served as the MEDiC student-run free clinics President. Currently, Ian is working on his WARM community service project – a Native students health careers camp for 12 Native high school students from the Oglala Sioux tribe in Pine Ridge and the Ho-Chunk Nation in Wisconsin.



Jonathan Strong was born and raised in Fond du Lac, and comes from a long line of family medicine physicians serving the State of Wisconsin. During his undergraduate studies at the University of Minnesota, Jon studied abroad in Kenya where he implemented a study of drinking water quality and volunteered with community health workers in impoverished urban neighborhoods. During medical school he studied global health policy at the World Health Organization headquarters in Geneva, Switzerland and did consulting work for the GAVI Alliance, a multinational organization that funds vaccination

programs in developing countries. Next year he plans to take a leave of absence from his medical studies to pursue a MPH at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health.

She attended the UW-Madison on a violin performance scholarship and graduated in 2010 with a BS in Music Performance and Medical Microbiology and Immunology. For the past year she has served as co-coordinator of the MEDiC Salvation Army Dental Clinic, during which time the clinic saw 265 patients over the course of 44 sessions and underwent a major renovation. She also served as an active member of the MEDiC Fundraising Committee. Katherine is co-leader of Coda Blue, the medical

student chamber music ensemble. Her extracurricular activities include playing violin in the Middleton Community Orchestra.



Heather Nennig's addiction to serving others started when she volunteered at her local food pantry over a decade ago. In high school, she played bingo with the elderly and served food to the homeless, and at Ripon College she led Habitat for Humanity Alternative Spring Break Trips and volunteered at local hospitals and libraries.
